Major Improvements In Medical Insurance For 1965

Memorex's Group Insurance Plan will be a lot more attractive this year as a result of major improvements which went into effect January 1, 1965.

These improvements will be available to you and your dependents without cost to you. Memorex will continue to pay the entire cost of the complete plan.

IMPROVED BENEFITS

Hospital "Extras" will now be payable up to \$1,000 per disability.

Hospital Emergency Care (or accident or surgery) will be payable up to \$1,000.

Surgical/Medical Benefits increased 37 1/2%.

For instance the maximum surgical allowance is increased from \$750 to \$825; Home visits are increased from \$7.50 to \$8.25.

New Medical Benefits are included in the Basic Plan.

Charges by an Assistant Surgeon are now included; as are consulting fees and special medical "work-ups".

Maternity Benefits increased from \$150 to \$400 for a normal birth. (Coverage for complications is also broader.)

Major Medical increased to \$20,000.

A NEW CONCEPT OF SERVICE

The Santa Clara County Medical Society is working with us to give you the best type of medical care. Through its Foundation for Medical Care it is "sponsoring" our plan. This means that if you use a doctor that is a member of the Foundation (about 80% of Santa Clara doctors) they agree not to charge you more than the plan will pay. You, thus, can end up with 100% payment of medical expenses.

But let us be clear about one thing. This does not mean that you have to use a Foundation doctor. You still have, and should exercise, free choice of physician. If you use a non-Foundation doctor the basic and major medical plan will pay just as if there were no Foundation involved; but this doctor has the right to charge you more than the plan's allowance.

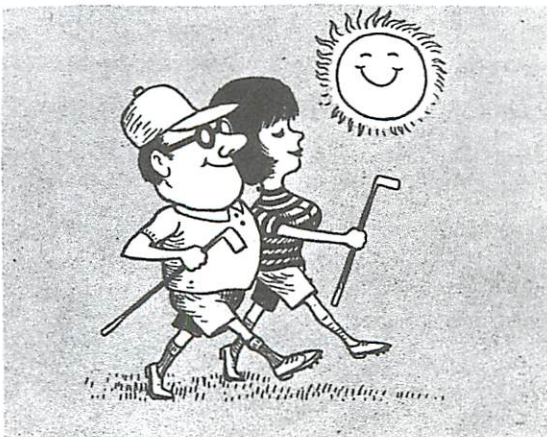
A list of Foundation doctors will be supplied in the near future.

This new plan has been adopted after months of study and comparison with many other plans in the area. We are convinced it affords you excellent protection and are happy to make it available to you as another way of indicating our desire to make Memorex a good place to work.

YOUR SPACE-AGE VOCABULARY

Keeping up with the news these days requires more than just reading the papers or tuning in on TV or radio. The newscasters, in their reporting, are using words we weren't taught in school.

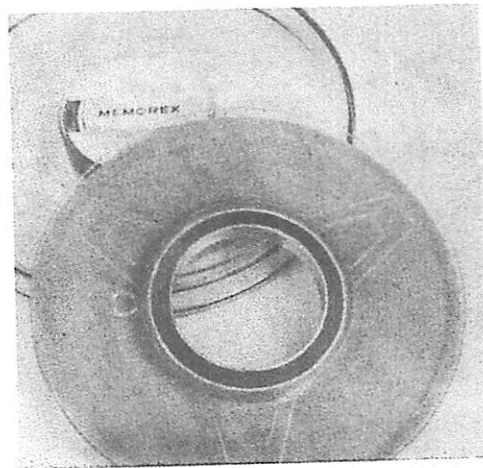
The reason is that, as man starts rolling back the frontiers of atomic and interplanetary space, he's using new concepts, new mechanisms and new terms.

As man's knowledge grows, his vocabulary must keep pace. The result is the coining of new words, or wider usage of terms previously familiar only to the technician and the scientist.

Here is a glossary of some of the more common space-age terms:

ACCELERATOR. As used in atomics, any device used to impart high speed to charged particles. The bevatron and cyclotron are the most widely used accelerators.

YOUR SPACE-AGE VOCABULARY-Continued

AERONAUTICS. The science of flight within the earth's atmosphere.

APOGEE. The point of orbit at which a satellite is farthest from earth.

ASTEROID. Generally, a small planet; especially one of the many small planets whose orbits lie between Mars and Jupiter.

ASTROGATION. Navigation by the stars in space flight.

ASTRONAUTICS. The science of space flight, as opposed to flight within the earth's atmosphere.

BALLISTIC MISSILE. A space shell, usually rocket-powered, and containing a guidance mechanism. After its engines burn out in the first stages of flight, it travels like an artillery shell aimed at a particular target.

BREAKOFF. A psychological state consisting of feelings of extreme detachment and isolation experienced in space flight.

CLOUD CHAMBER. A device for making sub-atomic particles visible.
